Interstate News

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The following item is from the Queensland N.P.A. Newsletter - Sept. 1967:

"A National Parks and Gardens Board has been established in the Territory of Papua and New Guinea. It has been set up under the National Parks and Gardens Ordinance and will manage and control National Parks Association of the A.C.T. Bulletin Oct.-Nov. 1967

such lands as are committed to its care."

The Board consists of 5 members. The Chairman is a New Guinean member of the House of Assembly.

From N.S.W. The September issue of the National Parks Journal states: "You will all have been aware that the National Parks and Wild Life Bill has been approved by the Legislative Council. It passed the third reading on Thursday 24th August. Owing to pressure from several conservation bodies some changes were incorporated in the Bill and one of the most important was that the Director of National Parks and Wildlife will be appointed by the Governor. Also, the Minister has been persuaded to free the Service from the "shackles of the development-orientated Lands Administration."

You will also have been aware of the controversy which has been expressed over the proposed park boundaries. It is hoped that this matter will be postponed until the National Parks Advisory Councibas been appointed. The re-shuffling of land, without concern for the type of country contained in the particular areas involved, should not be allowed without careful investigation.

The legislation should bring together in one service the related functions of national parks and fauna and flora protection which were previously spread among three administrative bodies. "Wildlife" will now include all animals, not just birds and mammals.

Burrendong Arboretum Association

This association is asking for donations of seed, plants or cash for developing the 350 acres of land they have which is 16 miles from Wellington N.S.W. overlooking the waters of Lake Burrendong. Their aim is to plant by degrees all the 10,000 species of Australian Native plants in groups and groves of ten to 25 of each species, keeping them as far as possible in broad family groups.

INTERTIDAL LIFE AT PEBBLY BEACH

During the recent excursion to Pebbly Beach, members examined the zonation of intertidal organisms on the rocky shores.

The characteristic organism at the uppermost limits of tidal influence is <u>Melaraphe</u>, a little blue-striped periwinkle. Another periwinkle, the knobbly white Nodilittorina, is more scattered;

but where it is present, it goes even higher on the shore than <u>Melaraphe</u>. These molluscs appear to feed on <u>Lichina</u>, a low tufted black lichen. <u>Melanerita</u>, a little round black-shelled gastropod, occurs with and below Melaraphe.

Below the periwinkles is a barnacle zone. In the bay, this zone tends to be dominated by <u>Chamaesipho columna</u>, a small white barnacle that may be so numerous as to form a dense crust on the rocks. Scattered <u>Saxostrea</u> (rock oyster) may accompany <u>Chamaesipho</u>. On the shores exposed to the full force of the open sea, the characteristic barnacles are the pink <u>Tetraclita</u> and the scaly <u>Catophragmus</u>. These "surf barnacles" are accompanied by several seasonal algae, namely the green alga <u>Ulva</u> (sea-lettuce), the rather similar red alga <u>Porphyra</u> (laver), and the brown alga <u>Splachnidium</u> ("sticky gloved fingers").

Below the barnacles is a zone characterized by <u>Galeolaria</u>, a sea-worm that secretes a limy tube. On flat or gently-sloping places, <u>Galeolaria</u> may largely be obscured by the brown alga <u>Hormosira</u> (Venus' necklace), and the red alga <u>Corallina</u>, a low tufted plant strongly impregnated with lime. <u>Galeolaria</u> and <u>Hormosira</u> are less noticeable on the exposed shores. On the bay shores, at and below this level, there are occasional specimens of <u>Codium</u> fragile, a stout much-branched green alga.

Below the <u>Galeolaria</u> zone, the characteristic animal is the ascidian <u>Pyura</u> (cunjevoi). In the lower part of the <u>Pyura</u> zone, the large brown alga <u>Phyllospora</u> appears; below the <u>Pyura</u> zone in turn, this alga forms a dense kelp belt that marks the lower limit of the intertidal region. On the exposed shores, <u>Phyllospora</u> may largely be replaced by <u>Pterocladia</u>, a feathery red alga that forms a distinctive dark red "turf" on the rocks. Also present at about the lower limit of the intertidal region is <u>Lithothamnion</u>, an encrusting limy red alga that looks like red paint on the rocks.

This account is neccessarily brief, and therefore oversimplified. For a very good popular account of the intertidal environment, and the specialized organisms found therein, read "Australian Seashores" by Dakin, Bennett, and Pope (Angus & Robertson). Most of the statements in this book that relate to the southern part of New South Wales can be regarded as applicable to Pebbly Beach.

There are three species of Wild Violet growing in the A.C.T.

The tufted one shown in the figure has flowers which are the true "violet" colour. It was called Viola betonicofolia because the leaves were thought to resemble those of the English herb Betony. It grows in our forests but is more common in cooler places at high levels. You can find it easily on Mt. Franklin or Mt. Gingera.

The second common species is <u>Viola hederacea</u> which has stems that trail on the ground and root at the nodes. The leaves are short and broad - almost kidney-shaped in outline. The petals are white with purple bases. This grows in many places in our forests. It often grows is the damp shelter of shaded road banks.

The third species, <u>Viola caleyana</u> is rare in the A.C.T. though it has been found in the upper part of the Orroral Valley.

It, too, has trailing stems but the leaves are heart-shaped and the petals almost white though their veins may be purplish.
