"DAILY HOLIDAYS"

The following article is a translation of a "soft sell" chocolate advertisement in a German magazine. The advice is no doubt sound and some of the ideas are reflected in National Park activities.

"Do not underestimate what a quiet hour can make up for. For example, in the evening in front of the window, quietly sitting in the easy chair and beholding how it becomes dark. To dream, to switch off, to throw everything overboard. The next morning you will be astonished how deep and peaceful you have subsequently slept.

Or to go walking. Simply walk and walk. Walk until everything is relaxed. The knotty irritation, the sticky worry, the niggly uneasiness. Until everything falls off you, until you are quite easy. Kosciusko National Park Draft Management Plan

A small group is studying the management plan and will send comments to the National Parks and Wild Life Service. Four members, Jenny Cusbert, Julie Henry, Rod Panter and Reg Alder, attended a meeting in Cooma of the Monaro Conservation Society at which the management plan was discussed. The Superintendent of the Kosciusko National Park addressed the meeting.

FROM THE BOTANY DEPARTMENT MONASH UNIVERSITY

PAINTINGS OF BANKSIAS

Monash University has commissioned Mrs. Celia Rosser to paint all the species of the genus Banksia; with the intention of publishing a monograph on the genus illustrated with these paintings. The project will take a number of years, and its success will depend on the help of many interested people all over Australia on whom we must rely for specimens, seeds and information. It is important that the living plants painted should be the wild species, from known localities, and not garden varieties that may derive from hybrids, and contain genetic material of different species. For this reason it will be necessary to make contacts with people who can collect seeds, and possibly flowering branches in the wild, and send them to the Botany Department. The project will involve the collection also of as much information as possible on such things as geographical distribution, variation, flowering times, pollination, and the techniques of germinating seeds and growing the plants. It is hoped to grow as many of the species as possible in a special garden at Monash. The complete set of original paintings will be displayed at Monash, and the published volume will be in a large-format with the best colour reproduction that can be obtained. M.J. Canny.

FIELD STUDIES ASSOCIATION OF THE A.C.T.

Since the public meeting in February at which it was agreed to form the Field Studies Association of the A.C.T., the affairs of the Association have been conducted by a Working Group. At the inaugural General Meeting on 10 July a constitution was adopted. The objects of the Association are:

- (a) to encourage and develop a proper and balanced community understanding of the environment by the community
- (b) to establish field study facilities including field study centres for the personal study of the environment
- (c) to provide courses, activities and information to assist in understanding the environment
- (d) to provide opportunities for those who wish to be personally involved in environmental education as defined by the Commission on Education of the International Union for the Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources in March 1970:

("Environmental education is the process of recognising values and clarifying concepts in order to understand and appreciate the interrelatedness among Man, his culture and his biophysical surroundings. Environmental education also entails practice in decision-making and self-formulation of a code of behaviour about issues concerning environmental quality.")

The N.P.A. has taken out Corporate Membership (\$5 p.a.). Gay Watt represented the N.P.A. at meetings of the Working Group and is a member of the Activities Standing Committee in a personal capacity. The President of the Field Studies Association is Laurie Westcott; the Secretary Margaret Balkers, 46 Vasey Crescent Campbell.

1973 PHOTOGRAPHIC COMPETITION

As distinct from a competition open to the general public in 1970, this year's contest was open to N.P.A. Members only. In addition to the competition sections in 1970, one more was added, namely "Man's Impact on the Environment". Provision was also made for the entry of black and white or colour prints.

Altogether 191 transparencies and 25 prints were received from 18 competitors, a very satisfactory response. These were judged by Colin Totterdell a professional photographer from C.S.I.R.O. and Allan Clark, President of the Canberra Photographic Society.

A selection of the slides, including prizewinners and highly commended entries was screened at the Association's annual general meeting on 19th July with comments and constructive criticism by the judges. Their informal style and interesting remarks in presenting the slides contributed greatly to the success of the competition. Mr. Clark's commendation of the generally high standard of entries is particularly noteworthy.

Grateful acknowledgements are due to Ian Currie and Gay Watt who assisted in the planning and organisation of the competition; also to Mr. Totterdell and Mr. Clark for undertaking this considerable task and for a memorable presentation at the General Meeting. Thanks are also due to the competitors whose contributions provided the material for a very interesting meeting.
